Students who enlist as Soldiers in the West Virginia National Guard receive in-state tuition rates and are eligible for 100% tuition assistance from the state.





Army ROTC is the premier leadership development internship on campus at West Virginia University. No other programs provide the leadership philosophy, education or practical hands-on training to prepare students for success in the military and corporate environment. ROTC is an elective course taken along with required courses in an individual's selected major. It provides the tools, training and experiential learning opportunities that will help you succeed in any competitive environment. Along with great leadership training, Army ROTC can also help pay for tuition, room and board and other college expenses. As an elective, ROTC allows you to participate during the freshman and sophomore years without incurring an obligation to join the Army. You will have a normal college student experience like everyone else on campus, but when you graduate, you will be commissioned as an officer in the Army. At that point, you will have a wide-range of career choices you can specialize in called services branches.

Your Commitment

Army ROTC students who receive an Army ROTC scholarship or enter the ROTC Advanced Course must agree to complete an eight-year period of service with the Army. Cadets selected for Active Duty service make a minimum active service commitment for three years (four years for scholarship recipients). Cadets who serve part-time in the U.S. Army Reserve or Army National Guard while pursuing a civilian career make a six-year commitment (eight years for scholarship recipients)

Mountaineer Battalion History

The history of Army Reserve Officer Training Corps at West Virginia University is as old as the university itself. The Morrill Act of 1862 signed by President Abraham Lincoln required all land grant universities to "teach such branches of learning as are related to agriculture, the mechanical arts and military tactics." On Feb. 8, 1867, the newly formed West Virginia legislature passed an act permanently establishing the Agriculture College of West Virginia, renamed West Virginia University a year later, and the WVU Corps of Cadets was officially born.

Specialized skills are part of every U.S. Army job. If you have a particular aptitude for science, technology, engineering or mathematics (STEM), your abilities are particularly in demand. Who is Eligible

Open enrollment allows all students to enroll in the Basic Course of ROTC (freshman & sophomore years). However, students must be a U.S. citizen and have a minimum overall GPA of 2.0 and a 3.0 average in all Military Science courses to be eligible to contract into the Advanced Course (junior & senior years). Students can take the Basic Course curriculum without making a commitment to serve in the Army unless they have received an Army ROTC Scholarship. Once enrolled in the Advanced Course (junior & senior years) the student incurs a mandatory eight-year service obligation.

Those who succeed in Army ROTC are students who are motivated to succeed and want something more than the average college experience. Generally, these students are scholars who keep excel in academics, athletes who are physically strong, and leaders who have a great desire to learn.
